

Organization & Accountability

To make this most of this opportunity, students must be prepared for all rehearsals, lessons and performances. Once **sheet music** is distributed students are expected to have it at all rehearsals. Please contact the director immediately if any music is lost as it must be replaced. Students may also be asked to purchase **method** books for sectional lessons. With so much to remember when building a performance, a **pencil** is essential at all rehearsals and students are expected to have one on hand. Finally, performing in a musical ensemble is most possible with a functional **instrument** on hand. Unless out for repair or an instrumental loan has been formally organized, students should not rely on the department to provide an instrument. Exceptions to this are percussionists and pianists.

Care for Classroom Materials

We are very privileged to have a large music program; made up of many students and countless school materials (music stands, instruments, percussion, etc.) It is our responsibility to see that this equipment continues to allow us to develop our skills and build our program Students are asked to help make sure equipment is cared for, stored properly, and the rehearsal space room is always left ready for the next group.

Contribution to the Progress of the Ensemble

We are a team. There is no "I" in Band. We are only as strong as our efforts and dedication allow us to be. There is no insignificant part and everyone must pull their weight. Come to rehearsal focused, practiced, and ready to show off your talents and hard work. Give constructive and respectful input, ask questions, give suggestions, we are a team.

To heighten the community aspect of Concert Band and make ensemble information more accessible, The Music Department has developed a website containing:

-An informational breakdown of performances for each ensemble

~ SECTIONAL LESSONS ~

Each instrumental group in the Concert Bands will receive a lesson time once every other 4-Day rotation (roughly 3 times per month). These meetings are a chance for students to rehearse and progress in a more concentrated environment. Lessons will focus on technical aspects of instrumental performance and a more catered rehearsal of ensemble pieces. It is also a chance to learn and perform music outside of the full ensemble repertoire. Students are encouraged to bring their ideas and suggestions for music to these rehearsals.

As with ensemble rehearsals, students are expected to be present and prepared for sectional lesson time. As these lessons are a formal class, attendance and preparation are graded and included in students' cumulative semester grade. A schedule of sectional times is provided to all classroom teachers, Instructional Assistants, is posted outside the band room and available on our band website.

~ STUDENT PERFORMANCE RECORDINGS ~

Periodically students will be asked to submit recordings of their playing (from home practice). This is an effort for the Director to assess progress, challenges, and structure rehearsals around the needs of the ensemble. These assignments will be given at the Director's discretion and due by the following sectional lesson meeting. Grading will be on a "complete/incomplete" basis.

To assist students in submitting their progress on instruments and ensemble work, we have utilized two applications allowing them to either call and record or email an audio file of their playing. Detailed system instructions are located in appendix section of this handbook. These systems are easy, quick, and free! They will provide the Band Director an opportunity to hear students play assignments individually and provide feedback.

~ INSTRUMENT RENTAL, REPAIR, AND MAINTENANCE ~

Parents are welcome to work with any company or trained professional. The Nock works exclusively with Music & Arts. Inc. for our instrument rental, repair, and maintenance needs. A representative visits the school weekly to pick up and drop off instruments. If any of these services are needed please contact the Director immediately. In cases of repair or maintenance, parents will be called or emailed by the Director or Music & Arts with a quote before services are rendered. Most often the Music Dept. can loan an instrument while the original is out.

~ STUDENT ASSESSMENT ~

As performance ensembles seldom make use of standard quizzes, tests, or written assignments students are assessed on effort displayed, musicianship, and contribution to the continued progress of the ensemble.

All grades, progress, comments, and averages are updated weekly on the district's *Aspen X2* site. Please refer as often as you wish to this site to monitor student's progress throughout the grading period.

Attention/Effort/Conduct (25%)

Becoming a strong and confident musician involves more than just playing. One must understand the material they are learning in order to process and master it. We will immerse ourselves in the music to make the most of this ensemble and grow as artists and performers. Students will be guided through the theory and history of compositions and be asked for observations when reading or listening to a piece. While a student may not always have an answer to contribute, they are asked to maintain respectful focus on the lesson or discussion and hopefully be inspired to ask a question or provide input when able.

Preparation for Rehearsal (20%)

Music is a hands on sport which requires consistent preparedness. Students are expected to have their instrument, a pencil, music, method books, and lesson/ensemble material at every rehearsal. We can only achieve our goals and reach our potential if every member does their part.

Detentions will be assigned for students who are consistently unprepared for rehearsal. This could be for as little as a pencil or as much as truancy from class. Please refer to the lesson and rehearsal schedule to ensure preparedness. Do not hesitate to contact the Director at any time with questions.

Playing Quiz / Test (25%)

There will be about 3 performance assessments throughout the semester. These assessments will be held during sectional lessons on a one-on-one basis with the Director. Students will be asked to play sections from their concert music and/or lesson material. A grading rubric for these assessments can be found in the appendix section of this handbook.

Practice Charts (30%)

In reality, meeting for one hour every four days is not a lot of rehearsal time. For this reason, we must use that precious time to do just that...rehearse. We cannot learn parts during rehearsal as it takes time away from the more challenging task of putting the parts together to create the whole.

Students are to be working on their music at home, during private lessons, and in sectional lesson time. The director is always available (and very willing) to meet for before/after school help.

On the practice charts, there is a space for students to make detailed notes of progress made, challenges encountered, or questions that arose during daily practice time. To ensure success, always check that charts are fully completed before handing them in.

Practice charts are due during sectional lessons. If a student is absent, please arrange a time to submit their practice chart to the director. Charts handed in 1 day after lesson times will receive half credit and will not be accepted after that. A printable file of practice charts is available on our band website

Practice Chart Grading

Students are expected to practice 5 times per week for a minimum of 15 minutes per day to earn an A.

Charts will be kept on file in the Music Department office and tallied at the end of the semester to formulate that portion of the student's semester grade.

The Practice chart grading is based on the number of times practiced per week (for at least 15 minutes), and will break down as follows:

More than 5-7 times per week: A+

4 times per week: A 3 times per week: B 2 times per week: C 1 time per week: D

Less than 1 time per week: F

Concerts / Performances

ATTENDANCE AT THE WINTER AND SPRING CONCERTS AND GRADUATION IS MANDATORY

As the dates have been given (later in the handbook) far in advance students are to make arrangements to ensure attendance.

Absences from these Concerts fall into two categories:

Unexcused Absence

Less than 2 week notice or no notice. **Points lost due to an unexcused absence cannot be made up.**This loss in points will result in a significant reduction in a student's grade. As it is crucial to the community of the program that we support each other students are required to remain for the duration of the concert. Please plan ahead to stay for the entire concert unless otherwise organized with the Director 2 weeks or more in advance.

Excused Absence

Illness, death in the family, or emergency situation. In those cases, please contact the Director prior to the concert. In the event of an excused absence, points will be made up through a "make-up" assignment that will be handed out in class. It is the student's responsibility to see the Director for make-up work. Work must be turned in one week after the assignment is given.

Extra Credit Opportunities

As it is understood that ensemble participation carries strong expectations students who attend or perform in any sort of musical program outside of school (recitals, musical theater, private lessons, church, camps, District, etc.) may submit a program and a 1-paragraph reflection of the performance. For each approved entry 2 points will be added to their semester grade. Only performances held during that grading semester may be applied and the same production may not be applied multiple times.

~ DEPARTMENT PERFORMANCE OPPORTUNITIES ~

In an effort to consistently highlight the accomplishments of our students and share our talents with the community we have developed an ambitious performance schedule for the year. As there are many opportunities to perform and students are encouraged to sign for as many as they wish, be aware that once you sign up for an event you are expected to perform. Always double check dates and times to avoid "double booking" or overwhelming yourself.

Email an Audio Recording

If you choose not to use the Google Voicemail option, you may create and email an audio recording using apps. such as "Voice Memo" available on Smartphones, IPODs, and IPADs.

This option gives students control to submit their best take. These features are also available to any SmartMusic subscribers.

To send a recording

- 1. Open the recording application on your device and push record
- 2. State your full name, instrument, grade, and what you will be playing
- 3. Move 3-5 feet away from the phone/device's microphone
- 4. Record your playing on your instrument
- 5. Email your best take to <u>bnickerson@newburyport.k12.ma.us</u>
